

## Autumn 1987 News Letter

o much has happened concerning Morton since the Annual General Meeting that you may find this news letter looking more like a saga, than a simple short set of notes.

Future Development of Morton

Probably the possible development of the village is the most important issue affecting Morton for many a year. You may remember that only a year ago we received and published, written confirmation from Bradford Planning Department stating that when the Upper Airedale plan was implemented the only land in Morton that could possibly be considered for development was a site at the side of Street Lane and this was only as a last resort. Now we are told that there is a recommendation before the Council to release certain areas of land around Morton for development. These areas are:-

- (1) Site of the old quarry in Morton Lane with a possible 60 houses.
- (2) Site near Swine Lane for possible 100 houses.
- (3) Site off Street Lane for 100 houses.

This makes a total possible increase, if granted, of 260 houses, which will increase the number of houses in the village by half as much again as at present. There is also the possibility that if the present proposals are approved that further areas of land adjoining the proposed developments could be granted planning permission with a potential for a further 400 houses, this more than doubling the size of the present village. Morton would then obviously become another urban sprawl. Although the owner of the quarry site has stated he has no intention of selling his land to any developer this will not alter the fact that if approved there will be the distinct possibility of the land being developed sometime in the near or distant future.

A full Council meeting is to be held to debate the issue but pressure is on to permit more areas to be developed such as Morton. This is happening only a year after Bradford Council stated in writing their intention to maintain the areas around Morton as Green belt. If you wish Morton to remain a village, you are urged to make known your objections, to the proposed new plans especially, in writing to either Bradford council direct or one of our local councillors~ Cllr K. Metcalfe, Cllr L. Owens or Cllr T. Flanagan c/o City Hall, Bradford.

Obviously such a large increase in houses and population would greatly and adversely affect the environment. With the increase in traffic on the roads and overloading of what are minimal services, Morton would be destroyed for ever more as a village.

An exhibition was held in the village institute on Sunday 18th October by the Village Society in order to show the whole village just what is planned for the future of Morton and how it will affect you. Diagrams and maps with full explanation were on view. Many villagers attended the exhibition and expressed their views.

#### Sunnydale

In addition to the Green Belt controversy, we heard recently that the Yorkshire Water Authority propose selling Sunnydale Reservoir and the surrounding land. On hearing of this proposed sale the Village Society contacted various organisations such as Bradford council, The Woodland Trust etc to see if they would be interested in buying the land, but as you might guess, no one has any money.

Bradford Council advise us that this area should be protected by the Upper Airedale plan but that is now obviously just a big joke. As you may now know we enlisted support from no less a weighty character than Dennis Healey who visited Sunnydale as a boy. Both he and our Chairman John Puddephatt appeared on a recent programme on Radio Leeds to discuss Sunnydale's future.

The present position of the Village Society is that if by any chance the Y.W.A. wish to dispose of Sunnydale at a nominal sum in order to rid themselves of the area, then we would wish to be considered as an interested party. If however, they require an enormous sum of money, then obviously it would be beyond the means of the Society to make an offer to purchase this local beauty spot.

The latest information we have from the Y.W.A. is that no decision regarding the actual sale of Sunnydale will be made before next year and if they decide to sell they will probably approach Bradford Met. before offering the land elsewhere. The Y.W.A. further state that they will take careful notice of the need to preserve the character and natural beauty of Sunnydale.
