FEAST MORTON Orchard Update

A sunny Saturday in March saw lots of volunteers, young and old, turn out to help plant East Morton's Community Orchard. Thank you to everyone who came along to lend a hand and offer support – it was a magical experience to see a plain stretch of grass transformed into a new orchard during the course of one day.



For anyone who hasn't been to the Rec since planting day, the orchard is at the top of the hill, tucked in on the side nearest the church. There are apple, cherry, plum, quince and gage trees, all of which are doing well despite the recent spell of cold weather. Each tree is protected against rabbits and the occasional visiting deer by a tubular tree guard, with a wooden tree guard providing extra protection from bounding dogs, runaway mowers and other dangers!



Feast Morton was extremely fortunate in having Russell Jeanes, a film-maker who lives in the village, along to record the creation of the orchard. Russell has made a wonderful film which you can watch online (either via https://vimeo.com/39436071 or seach for "east morton community orchard" on YouTube). Thank you Russ for capturing everything about planning and planting the orchard so well.





In the autumn we will complete the planting with the addition of about a dozen more trees – more apples, some pears and a couple of cobnut trees. We also hope to have an information board in the future to show where the different varieties are and when they fruit, plus other information about how the orchard is managed.
