We had a great success last year but after the last MIB meeting it was agreed by all that we will not enter the Yorkshire-in-Bloom competition in 2011. This decision was not taken lightly, however, it is based on harsh reality.

The truth is we do not have enough regular volunteers for the jobs that need doing in 2011 to enable us to do well and retain what

we have won last year.

While we have had much financial help from many quarters, in particular the Village Society and Keighley Town Council, I have regularly documented the fact we lack practical helpers, it is things like weeding, digging, planting, cutting back, picking up litter and especially watering in particular, that we have been unable to attract enough helpers for. I would like to thank those people who have helped in various capacities (you know who you are)!

We have had a tremendous two years and reached the second highest award, we are proud of our efforts and so we should be.

However, we are at a crossroads. We cannot move forward without a big influx of new help, we are not prepared to enter for the sake of it and risk going backwards. The feeling is it is not fair to keep putting an increasing burden on existing MIB volunteers, many of whom have health issues.

On a more positive note - we will continue as MIB, we will still meet monthly and we will still be active, I will still be leading the group as before. The group will not die and neither will we walk away from our commitments.

We are going to scale down our operation to reflect the small but keen group that I have. It is either this or we will all get fed up, the rot will set in and the group will end up disbanding. None of us want to see this, but this in no way reflects on each and every one of you who have helped. It is just a time to take stock, consolidate and see where we go from here.

Telephone Kiosk

There have been concerns that our remaining red telephone box may one day vanish! Under Ofcom regulations BT must consult with the Local Authority regarding removal of a kiosk if there is not another payphone facility with 400 metres. In our case therefore, consultation would take place with Bradford Council. BT have confirmed that the kiosk is presently not viable and will be included in the next rationalisation programme. It is hoped with the support of the local council, who have indicated interest, that we shall be able to "Adopt the Kiosk". This could be a future feature for Morton in Bloom.

Pathway extension

We were delighted to learn that the Area Committee have given the go ahead to the extension of the path around the Recreation Ground, to cross to the top of Cliffestone Drive. This has been a project that we wished to come to fruition for some years and walking this route will soon be a year round possibility, without getting extremely muddy. More importantly, it will be a safer route from the bottom of the village to the top without negotiating the narrow footpath along Morton Lane bordering the churchyard – not easy with a buggy and toddlers, the estimated cost is £3,500.

Noticeboard

We are looking into the possibility of siting a noticeboard at Waterside Fold, probably bordering the open space in the middle. It is hoped this will happen during the coming months.
