Keighley Town Council has offered to pay the costs of upkeep – bills, rates, repairs and overheads in general, including the costs of cleaning materials. A condition of this offer is that the opening and closing are to be the responsibility of the VS plus any costs of cleaning should it be decided to take it on. At the time of writing we have had one volunteer to clean but no one to lock up.

Christmas lights



East Morton goes to War

We arrived at the Memorial Institute on the afternoon of Saturday 8th November 2014 to find ourselves transported back in time one hundred years to the early weeks of the First World War. As we entered the 'restaurant' to partake of our afternoon tea we experienced the authentic atmosphere of the dining tables beautifully laid with the china tea services provided by Stephanie who, with the help of Barbara and Karen, had prepared the excellent food we were soon to enjoy.

Tea consisted of a range of beautifully cut sandwiches of the day, a marvellous selection of freshly baked cakes and a limitless supply of tea supplied by the efficient team of waiters and waitresses. The whole experience was one not to be missed!

As tea drew to a close our 1914 concert party, which closely resembled our church choir, took to the stage. Ably led and conducted by their captain, Sally Dow, who happened to be carrying an authentic war wound of her own, and compered by that inimitable master of ceremonies, David Flaherty, looking every inch a General Haigh, we were treated to a good selection of the songs of the day and readings from wartime letters and poems. When the songs were familiar the assembled tea party joined in lustily, thereby providing a clue as to their ages.

All too soon the entertainment and the tea came to an end but this provided an opportunity for us to visit the impressive First World War exhibition in the adjoining and newly-refurbished Doris Beanlands room. We could happily have whiled away a few hours there but our particular memories are the stories of the brothers in the village who volunteered to fight in the armed forces and the fascinating story of the isolation hospital on the East Morton/Riddlesden boundary which served as the major military hospital during and after the War.

We returned to the Institute in the evening to enjoy the fascinating and interesting talk given by Ian Dewhirst which gave us an insight into Keighley at war. We have attended a number of Ian's talks over the years and have always been thoroughly entertained. This was no exception. As usual he gave much more than a talk, he shared an experience. As often happens Ian's enthusiasm for his subject caused him to overrun but no one minded!

So the curtain came down on a thoroughly enjoyable and interesting day. Occasions like this don't just happen. They involve an awful lot of planning and hard work. Our heartfelt thanks go to everyone involved; to Rhona, Stephanie, Barbara and Karen, to Sally, David, and the choir, to Richard Walsh for assisting Rhona in arranging the exhibition, and to lan.

Florence Bramall 1925-2105

Florence was born in Upper Mill Row, her mother was a Micklethwaite girl, one of 14, she won a scholarship to Bingley Grammar School, after which, she joined the Tax Office. Marriage came late for Florence, and she was in her fifties when she and Laurie wed. Always seen out in a hat, and at funerals in a big red coat, Florence was known by all. The children at the school would call "Hi, Auntie Florence" as she passed, and she loved to talk - many a person emerged an hour after going in for a five-minute chat! She was a caring and generous woman.

Along with other village stalwarts, including Doris Beanlands, Eric Brunton and Kathleen Atkinson, she took an active part in village life, helping to establish several groups. She and Doris set up the meals-on-wheels service in Morton, one of the first in the country, and, together, they helped regenerate Morton Gala.

Their dedication was formally recognised when they received an invitation to a Buckingham Palace Garden Party, some ten years ago.



School Corner

School was extremely busy during the run up to Christmas. Reception and Key Stage 1 children performed a wonderful 'Wriggly Nativity' and Years 3 and 4 led the rest of Key Stage 2 in telling the Christmas Story during the school's Christmas Service at St Luke's Church. The School Choir had a very hectic schedule, singing at the school Christmas Fair, Carols in the Barn at Riddlesden Hall, Morton Close Residential Home, the Carol Service and the Village Christmas Lunch.

Their Christmas Fair, held at the end of November, was a great success and we would like to thank everyone in the village who supported this event. In the run up to Christmas, Friends held 'Santa's Secret Room', where the children visited a festively decorated room full of wonderful gifts; it was lovely to watch the children carefully selecting the perfect presents for their family members. Finally, in the last week of term, Friends held Christmas discos for the children, complete with glow sticks and bubbles!

We very much appreciate all the hard word that Friends of Morton put in to raising funds for our school throughout the year, and the support that parents and villagers give to the events they organise. Just before Christmas, the Chair of the Friends Committee, Becca Ashton, was able to present Headteacher Katie Savage with a cheque for £11,404.48. Thanks to this generous donation, we now have an amazing range of new musical instruments in our music room and have been able to revamp the school library with bright new furniture and brand new books, selected by the children themselves from a roving book shop which visited school in November. The library was launched at a special Story Night, organised by Friends, on 23rd January. Forthcoming Friends events, which all villagers are welcome to attend, are the Annual Quiz Night on the evening of Friday 27th February and the Mothers' Day Cake Stall which will be held at the end of school on Friday 13th March. We hope to see you there.





Fortunately the weather held for us on our first Apple Day held outside in the community orchard last November. An active day it was too because it was also one of our monthly working sessions and we were installing two rustic benches in the middle of the orchard. Visitors to the marguee were treated to some fine homemade soup, bread and cakes, and, most importantly, freshly squeezed apple juice and the spectacle of the apple press being worked. All this to the background sound of smoking electric drills, hammering and grunting as the hefty benches were put in. Well who needs reality TV when you can have this?

Thank you to all those who came to the event and supported us. For those unable to make it you may have seen the photo feature in Keighley News and now on the notice board in the Institute.

Work on the benches is not complete. When we can raise more funds we will install a third bench to match the first two - Alder wood is naturally rot resistant but also treated, and looked after well, will last many years. The third bench will complete a horseshoe arrangement that will complete an outdoor classroom, a place for social gatherings, or somewhere to just sit and reflect and absorb the views.

The orchard is maturing well and in February we will start our monthly work sessions to tidy up, assess how the trees have fared over the winter and do some initial pruning depending on the weather. This will be on the 15th so why not join us for a session? We meet at the orchard on the third Sunday morning of each month around 10am.

There is much that needs doing ahead and we need to pace ourselves in order to enjoy the journey. Having more people involved would help whether for planning, fundraising, practical help, expertise, communications or even writing pieces for the newsletter! We are planning an information board, permanent labels for the trees, and hope to eventually manage the area of the orchard as meadow with wild flowers.
